Conference organising success

Dr lain Robertson teamed up with **Dr Laura Denning** (independent artist, and University of Plymouth) to organise a symposium this April, titled <u>Island narratives of kinship</u>, <u>place</u>, <u>and the weather</u>. The event took place both in person in South Uist, hosted by Ceòlas and UHI North, West and Hebrides, and online, drawing attendees and speakers from all over the world.

Dr Kathrin Zickermann was one of the key organisers of the inaugural REMRA online conference, Northern Narratives, on 11-13 June. The alliance focusses on Renaissance and Early Modern research, and the conference saw more than 80 attendees take part across three days, with several Centre for History staff delivering papers, including a keynote by Dr Lucy Dean.

Leverhulme Trust Funding Success

Congratulations to **Dr lain Robertson**, who has secured Leverhulme Trust funding for his project 'Resistance to 'improvement' in the Highlands and Islands, 1750 – c. 1820'. This collaborative project will see Dr Robertson working with **Prof Carl Griffin** (University of Sussex and visiting professor at UHI Centre for History) and **Dr**



Juliette Desportes, who joined the Centre for History as a Post-Doctoral Research Assistant in March 2025.

The project investigates how rural workers in the Highlands sought to defend their livelihoods and ways of life in the age of radical 'improvements' which transformed the social and economic basis of Scottish agriculture. The project will use archives from across the Highlands and Islands and in Edinburgh to look for evidence of resistance of all sorts and forms, not just riots.


Dr Linsey Hunter and Dr Kathrin Zickermann helped to coordinate a networking day for the Renaissance and Early Modern Research Alliance (REMRA) and Medieval Studies Hub (MeSH) in Perth and online on 16 May. The day of dialogue between hub members and external representatives from the heritage, museums and archives sector was extremely productive and has laid groundwork for future collaboration across the UHI partnership and beyond.

New book published

We are excited to announce the publication of **Dr Nicola Martin's** first monograph, *The British Army in Scotland and North America 1745-*1775: Militarisation of



the Fringes of the Empire. Employing a transatlantic, case study approach, it investigates the overarching cultural frameworks, individual circumstances, and local conditions guiding the actions and understandings of British army officers.
